Grateful thanks go to Rosie for giving us this wonderful opportunity to learn another dog training method.

Welcome to Jenny Patch, a long term member of our Club with Billy, her Cattle dog. Jenny is our latest new Assistant Instructor, and has joined Bob in Class 2. Jenny can also be found in the Club house early on Sunday mornings to assist with all your equipment needs.

Our new committee members are settling in to their new roles; Henry and Cheryl just love taking your money, \$ (*see note at end of Newsletter) so far this year in training fees, memberships and equipment sales, and Jenny is busy keeping track of all our members. Don't be surprised if Henry soon starts giving you all the "stamp" of approval! He has suggested using a stamp on each handlers hand, rather than issuing the raffle tickets, and this will commence soon.

President Peter will submit the plans for the Clubhouse awning to the Showground Management Committee at their meeting this month. Thank you to Roy once again for drawing up the plans for us. If the Management Committee agrees with our request then an application can be submitted to Shoalhaven Council for approval for the work. The awning will provide an area to keep the agility equipment under cover so it is protected from the weather.

Teaching Your Dog a Trick

As part of our 8 week Beginners Course we ask new members to teach their dog a trick to be demonstrated on week 8. This has been a lot of fun, and our new members have managed amazing tricks with their dogs,

here are some tips on a couple of basic tricks to teach your dog – have fun !

The key to teaching your dog tricks is a lot of repetition and rewards. It is important to reward your dog with praises and/or treats when he is learning how to perform a new trick. Positive reinforcement is key. Only practice tricks for a few minutes at a time, your dog may become tired or frustrated because repeating tricks over and over may cause your dog's muscles to become fatigued. After each session reward your dog with a fun play session.

Paw

This is a fairly easy trick to teach your dog. The paw trick is your dog shaking your hand. Start by having your dog sit and simply reach your hand out and take hold of your dog's paw while saying "Paw". After a while all you have to do is reach out your hand and say "Paw" and your dog will put his paw in your hand.

TIP:

After a while, say, "Shake hands," but don't take his paw. See if he raises his paw by himself. If not, keep showing him what to do by saying, "Shake hands," and taking his paw with your hand. Your dog is not slow; he is just learning!

Roll Over

Start by having your dog lie down on his belly. You can stand over him or kneel beside him. Using a treat, hold it by his nose, and then move it around and behind him, so that he lies on his side and then rolls over. Tell him what a great dog he is! Only roll your dog on soft surfaces like carpet or grass so he doesn't hurt his back. Some dogs don't like to roll over. It can be a little scary for them to put their belly up. Try it a few times and but if it's not fun for your dog, choose another trick.


May and June Newsletters
